About this document

This pack consolidates the quotes, supplier evidence, and revised costings that sit behind the Kai Ora Fund 2026 application (Kai-083). Since the application was submitted on 17 May 2026, several lines have been refined as supplier conversations progressed. The biggest change is the move from DIY timber raised beds to Steelmates aluminium-coated zinc beds: four funded by Kai Ora, plus a separate speculative application for two additional beds via Steelmates' We Give Back community programme. The We Give Back contribution is not confirmed and the project does not depend on it — if it doesn't come through, the garden launches with four beds at no change to the Kai Ora ask.

Total ask to Kai Ora remains \$4,530.00. Where individual lines have shifted, the Budget Reconciliation Summary on the next page shows old, new, and the offsetting moves that keep the overall ask unchanged.

Key changes from the original application

Raised beds — Steelmates (instead of DIY timber). Four beds funded by Kai Ora at \$88 less than the original DIY timber estimate, with substantially better lifespan and food safety. A separate, speculative application has been made to Steelmates' We Give Back community programme for two additional beds at no cost; **this is not confirmed and the project does not depend on it.** If it's declined, the garden launches with four beds and the Kai Ora ask is unchanged.

Soil & compost — quote up by \$248.80. KLS actual quote for 5 m³ Grandpa's Garden Mix delivered to Donnellys Crossing is \$1,148.80 (\$700 product + \$448.80 delivery). Underspends on beds, signage, seeds, bananas, and tree support sum to \$249 — covering the soil increase exactly. Total ask to Kai Ora remains \$4,530.00.

Mulch — removed from the KLS order. KLS quoted a second \$448.80 delivery for mulch (separate truck). Mulch will instead come from sheep wool dags (in-kind), Forest Floor picked up locally, or local woodchip as fallback.

Lines carried at application figures. Community food stand (\$450) and diesel/fuel (\$400) are carried without revised supplier quotes — see Sections 3 and 6.

Section 1 — Raised Garden Beds — why we changed approach

The original application costed six DIY timber beds at \$1,400. That was the plan at the time the application was submitted on 17 May 2026.

The visit to Waikarā Marae changed our thinking. Two days after submitting the application, several DCCG members visited Waikarā Marae's papakāinga gardens — three years ahead of where we're starting — to learn from their experience. One of the clear messages we took away was that timber beds in Northland's humid subtropical climate rot far sooner than people expect, and that the labour to repair and replace them comes out of the same volunteer pool that's trying to grow food. Waikarā's whānau encouraged us to invest in beds that would outlast the people who built them.

We reassessed. Once the true like-for-like cost of timber beds was tallied (sleepers, fasteners, corner brackets, weatherproofing, the inevitable re-treatments), the premium on Steelmates aluminium-coated zinc beds was modest, and the lifespan and food-safety arguments tipped the decision. Detail on the bed specification, the four Kai Ora-funded beds, and the speculative We Give Back application for two more (**not confirmed**) follows on the next pages.

Net effect on the Kai Ora ask. The revised Steelmates line is \$1,312.00 — \$88.00 below the original \$1,400.00 estimate. This \$88 contributes to the offset for the increased soil delivery cost. Total ask to Kai Ora remains \$4,530.00.

Raised Beds — Steelmates Approach

The Uey Kai Garden | Donnellys Crossing Community Group | Kai Ora Fund 2026 (Application Kai-083)

Approach

Six aluminium-coated zinc raised beds from Steelmates NZ, structured as two complementary strands: four beds purchased through Kai Ora funding, and two additional beds applied for through Steelmates' "We Give Back" community programme as a separate in-kind contribution. This approach delivers more beds than the original application planned, at a higher quality, without increasing the Kai Ora ask.

Why Steelmates over DIY timber

The original application costed six DIY timber beds at \$1,400. On revisiting the scope, Steelmates aluminium-coated zinc beds were assessed as the better long-term investment:

- **Lifespan** — 25+ years for coated zinc vs 7-10 years for timber sleeper beds in Northland's humid climate
- **Food safety** — No leaching from treated timber preservatives into food-growing soil
- **Maintenance** — No rot repairs, no annual re-treatment, no fastener corrosion
- **Aesthetic** — Clean, consistent appearance suitable for a public-facing reserve
- **Like-for-like cost** — Once timber, fasteners, corner brackets, and waterproofing are properly costed, the steel premium narrows considerably
- **Made in NZ** — Manufactured in Auckland, supporting domestic manufacturing

Each bed is built from two components: a galvanised steel end kit, and a pair of extension panels forming the long sides.

The We Give Back contribution is acknowledged on the main garden signage. If the application is unsuccessful, the garden proceeds with four beds funded by Kai Ora; no fallback purchase is required from the Kai Ora line.

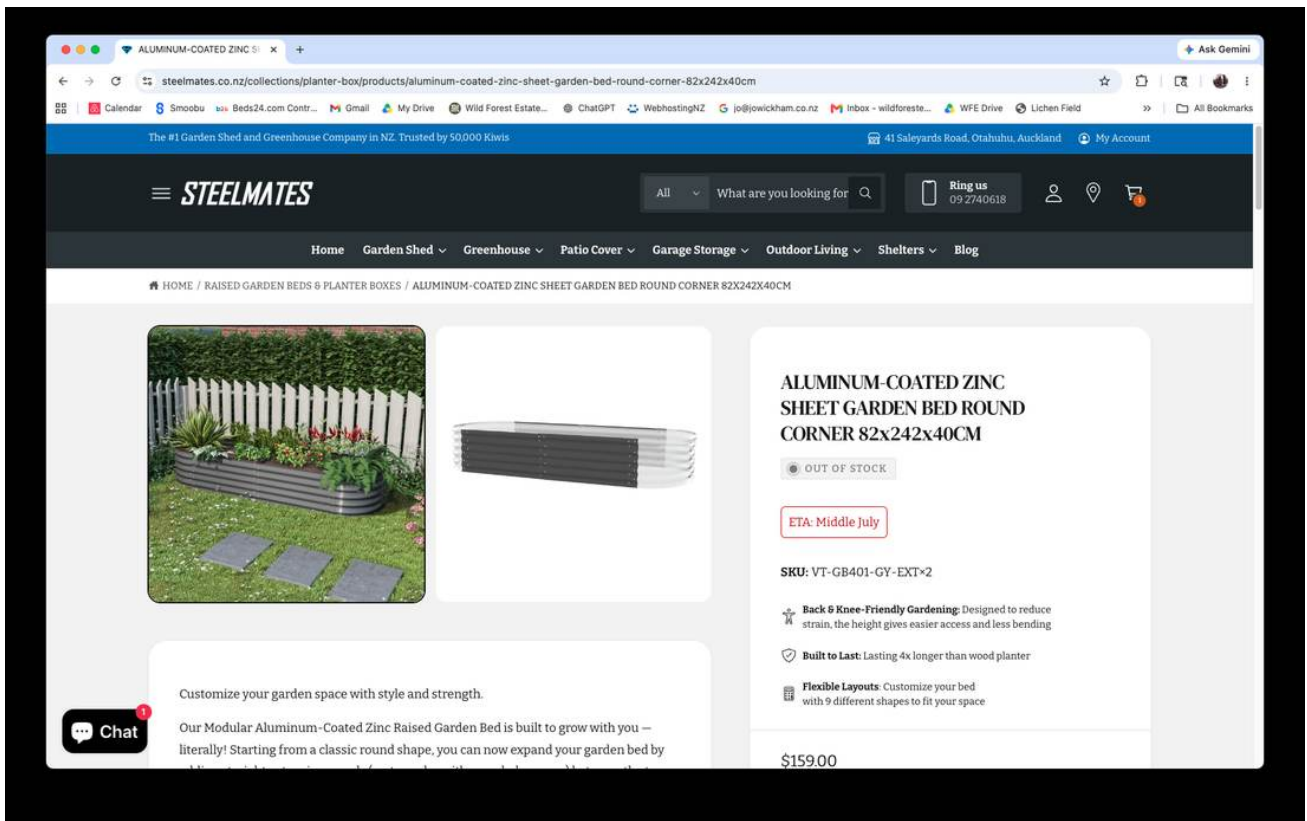
Specification has shifted from DIY timber (6 beds) to Steelmates aluminium-coated zinc (4 beds via Kai Ora + 2 beds via Steelmates' We Give Back programme). Bed count delivered to the project is unchanged at six; quality, lifespan, and food safety are substantially improved; total cost to Kai Ora is \$88 lower than the original line.

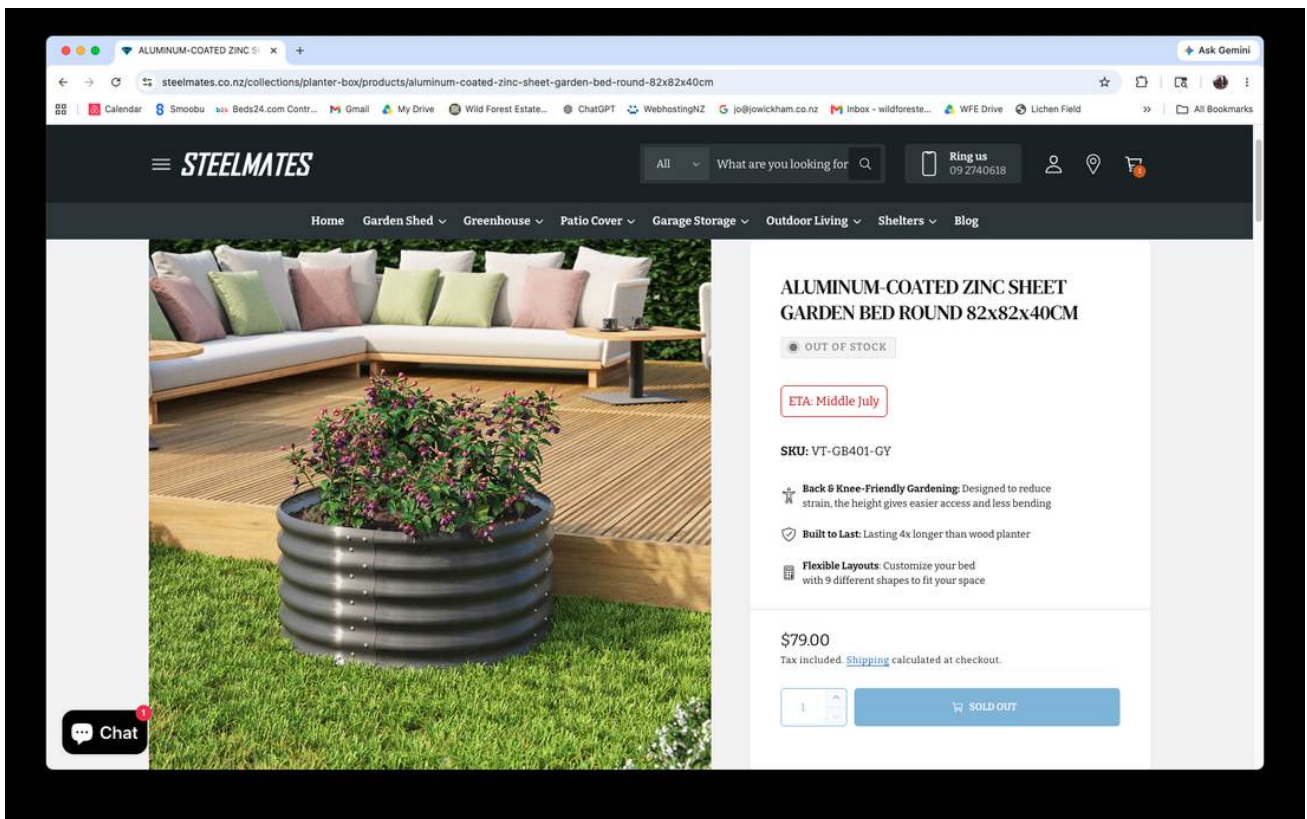

Section 2 — Soil & Compost

Supplier: Kaipara Landscape Supplies (Dargaville). Phone 0800 769 843.

Product: Grandpa's Garden Mix — 5 m³ at \$140/m³ = \$700.00. Delivery to Donnellys Crossing = \$448.80. **Total \$1,148.80 incl. GST.**

Volume reasoning. Six Steelmates beds at 0.82 × 2.42 × 0.63 m hold roughly 1.25 m³ each, but are typically filled in layers (logs, brush, compost, soil mix) — 5 m³ of Grandpa's Mix tops the upper growing zone and is the most KLS can deliver on a single truck. Any shortfall is topped up from on-site compost.

Mulch decision. KLS quoted a separate \$448.80 delivery for mulch (two-truck job). To keep the budget at \$4,530 we are dropping the KLS mulch line and sourcing mulch from sheep wool dags (in-kind, local farms), small local Forest Floor pickups where possible, or local woodchip as fallback. The KLS quote below shows the mulch option pricing for reference.

Variance. Application line \$900.00 → revised \$1,148.80, a \$248.80 increase covered by underspends on Steelmates, signage, seeds, bananas, and tree support (see Budget Reconciliation).

Section 3 — Community Food Stand

Budget line: \$450.00 (carried at application figure).

Status. No revised supplier quote at the time of this pack. The food stand is designed for community-build using local labour, with the budget covering H3 treated framing, corrugated roofing, exterior ply, paint, and fixings.

Why no third-party quote yet. The food stand design is being developed in parallel with the bed build — the final dimensions and mounting depend on where it sits on the Uey relative to the beds and the existing BBQ shelter. Materials will be sourced from Bunnings/Mitre 10 Whangārei using current shelf prices at the time of purchase. The \$450 figure is consistent with comparable community-built roadside stands of this size.

Plan to confirm. Materials list and supplier prices will be confirmed and logged with DCCG before the build day, ahead of any spend against this line. Any underspend returns to project contingency in the usual way.

In-kind contributions. Design, build, painting, and installation provided by DCCG volunteers. Estimated 1–2 working bee sessions.

Seeds and Seedlings – Plan

The Uey Kai Garden | Donnellys Crossing Community Group | Kai Ora Fund 2026 (Application Kai-083)

Approach

Three specialist suppliers, each chosen for what they do well. Kūanga supplies NZ heritage seeds — the same kaupapa as our heritage fruit trees from Forgotten Fruits. Kings Seeds covers any varieties Kūanga doesn't hold. Awapuni Nurseries supplies autumn seedlings to give a head start on slower crops.

Seed saving as the long game

The Kūanga Beginner Gardener Kit is designed around saved-seed varieties — every packet can be grown out, seed collected, and re-sown the following year. As the working group becomes more confident over the first 12–18 months, the garden's seed supply can shift from "purchased annually" to "saved from last year's crop." This is the same kaupapa Kūanga itself was founded on: NZ heritage food plants surviving because communities save and share them. Over time, the Uey Kai Garden becomes its own small seed bank for Donnellys Crossing.

Variance from original application

The original application named Kings Seeds, Awapuni Nurseries, and Bunnings/Mitre 10. The revised plan adds Kūanga (NZ heritage seeds, aligned with the project kaupapa) and drops Bunnings/Mitre 10 in favour of specialist suppliers. Budget line unchanged at \$200; estimated underspend of \$15 to project contingency. Final prices to be confirmed against supplier websites at point of order; current estimates based on Kūanga 2026 catalogue and indicative pricing from Scorpio Books (third-party Kūanga reseller).

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Signage — Materials and Approach

The Uey Kai Garden | Donnellys Crossing Community Group | Kai Ora Fund 2026 (Application Kai-083)

Approach

The Uey Kai Garden's signage will be community-built rather than commercially produced. This fits the kaupapa of the project: indigenous principles, local relationships, and community capability are part of the frame from the beginning, not added at the end.

A hand-painted main board, made by the people who will tend the garden — potentially including the children involved in the kids' plot — carries the story of the project more authentically than an off-the-shelf metal sign. Bed labels and the "what's in season" board follow the same approach.

Bed labels and "what's in season" board

These will be made from offcuts and existing community stock — wood, weatherproof marker pens, and small chalkboard or paint-finished panels. No additional purchases required.

Labour and design

All design, painting, lettering, and installation provided by Donnellys Crossing Community Group volunteers as an in-kind contribution. Estimated labour: 1-2 working bee sessions.

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Section 6 — Diesel & Fuel

Budget line: \$400.00 (carried at application figure).

What this covers. Diesel and fuel costs across the build phase — tractor and digger fuel for site preparation, truck fuel for collecting bed components and materials from Whangārei/Auckland, mower fuel for working bee site maintenance, and chainsaw/two-stroke for clearing.

Why no fixed quote. Fuel pricing varies week to week and the actual fuel burn depends on how much site prep is needed and how many supplier collection trips DCCG members make in their own vehicles versus consolidated delivery. The original application notes this estimate explicitly: *“This is just an estimate. The way things are going, we have no idea really.”*

Controls. Fuel reimbursements to DCCG volunteers will be tracked with receipts. Any underspend returns to project contingency.

Sourcing approach

Six fruit trees suited to year-round productivity in Northland have been sourced from three specialist NZ suppliers, each selected for their expertise in the relevant fruit category. All trees are NZ-grown and supplied via established nurseries with verified online catalogues. Prices below are taken from current supplier catalogues and product pages (May 2026).

Supplier notes

Forgotten Fruits Nursery — Family-run Northland nursery (Mangawhai), specialising in heirloom varieties bred for Northland's humid subtropical conditions. Trees grown organically with regenerative practices. Flat-rate \$56 per tree, GST included. Reference: 2026 Heirloom Fruit Tree Catalogue.

Flying Dragon Nursery — Kerikeri, Northland. Citrus specialists, propagating onto NZ rootstocks. Trees selected for cold-hardiness and reliability. Genoa lemon is thornless (important for a community garden with children). Kawano Satsuma mandarin is easy-peel and seedless. Tax included; shipping calculated at checkout.

The Plant Company — National NZ nursery, full feijoa range. Unique and Apollo selected as a cross-pollinating pair — Unique is self-fertile insurance, Apollo extends the fruiting window. 2.5L container size (35-50cm plants). Free shipping on orders over \$150.

Why these varieties

Variety selection prioritised reliability in Northland conditions, suitability for a community food stand (e.g. thornless, easy-peel, seedless where possible), and the heritage/local provenance aligned with the project kaupapa. The feijoa pair was selected following NZ Feijoa Growers Association guidance for cross-pollination; Unique flowers early and Apollo mid-late, extending the harvest period available at the food stand.

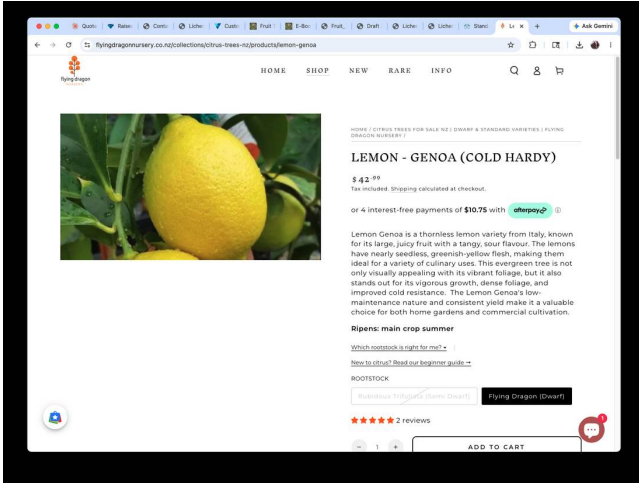

Any underspend on this line will be returned to project contingency.

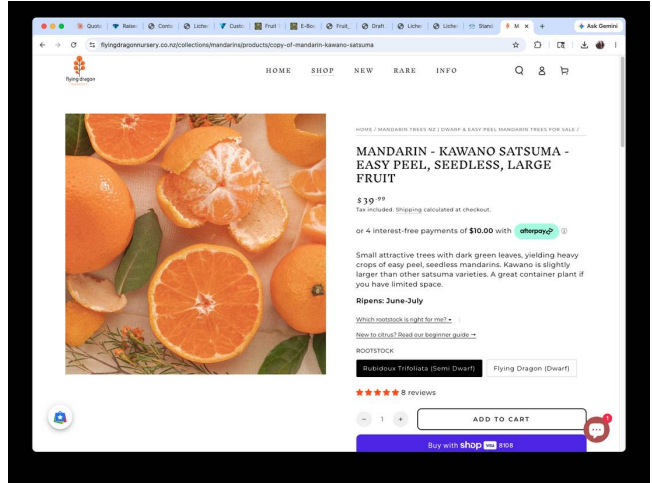

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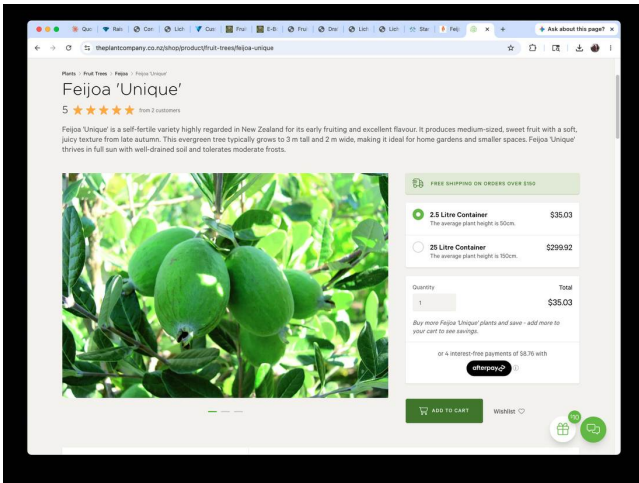

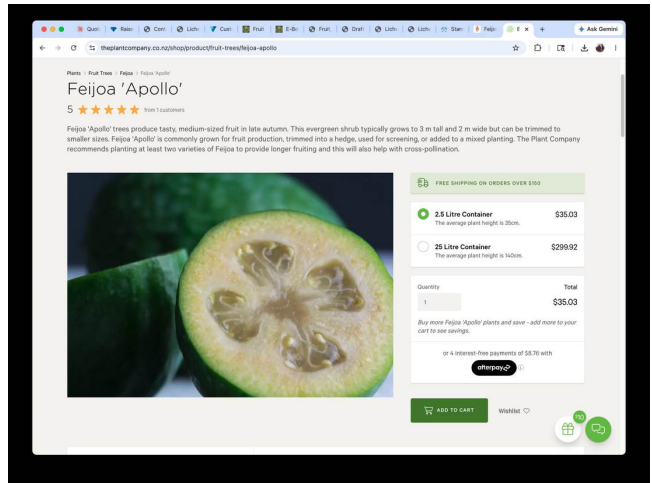

Banana Plants — Plan

The Uey Kai Garden | Donnellys Crossing Community Group | Kai Ora Fund 2026 (Application Kai-083)

Approach

Three banana plants from Flying Dragon Nursery (Kerikeri), consolidated with our existing citrus order. Two Misi Luki (the proven NZ favourite) and one Goldfinger (Honduran cold-tolerant) — the mix gives both productivity and resilience against Donnellys Crossing's occasional inland cold snaps. Bananas sucker and form clumps; three plants well-managed become a productive grove for the community within three years.

Why this variety mix

Misi Luki is the most widely grown banana in NZ for good reason — it produces tight bunches of sweet, short lady finger bananas and is well-suited to Northland conditions. Goldfinger is a Honduran-bred cultivar selected specifically for cold tolerance and disease resistance, valuable insurance against the occasional cold snaps that reach inland from the Kauri Coast. Together the three plants offer redundancy: if one variety struggles in a given year, the other still produces.

Consolidation with existing order

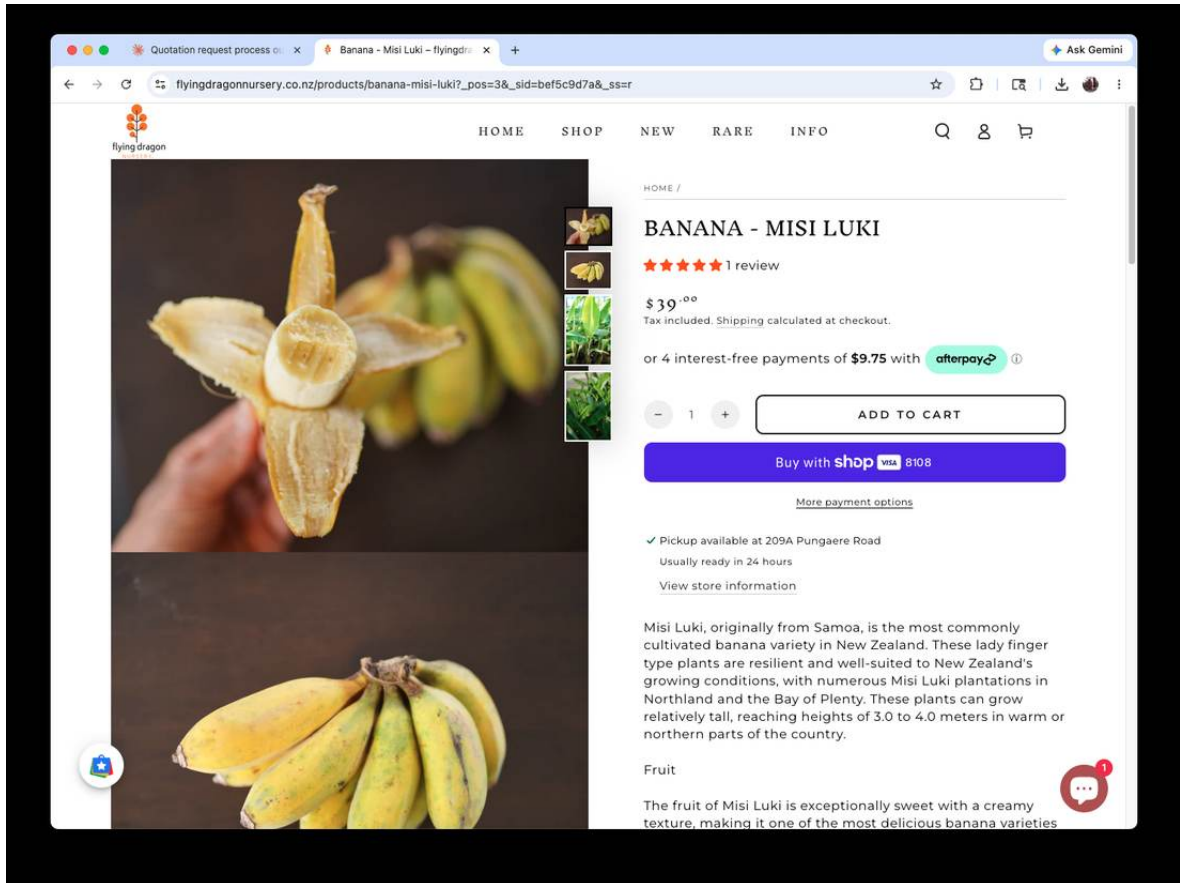
These bananas will be added to our existing Flying Dragon Nursery order for the Genoa lemon and Kawano Satsuma mandarin. One supplier, one delivery, one freight charge across all five plants from Flying Dragon — simpler administration and lower combined shipping cost than splitting across multiple suppliers.

Variance from original application

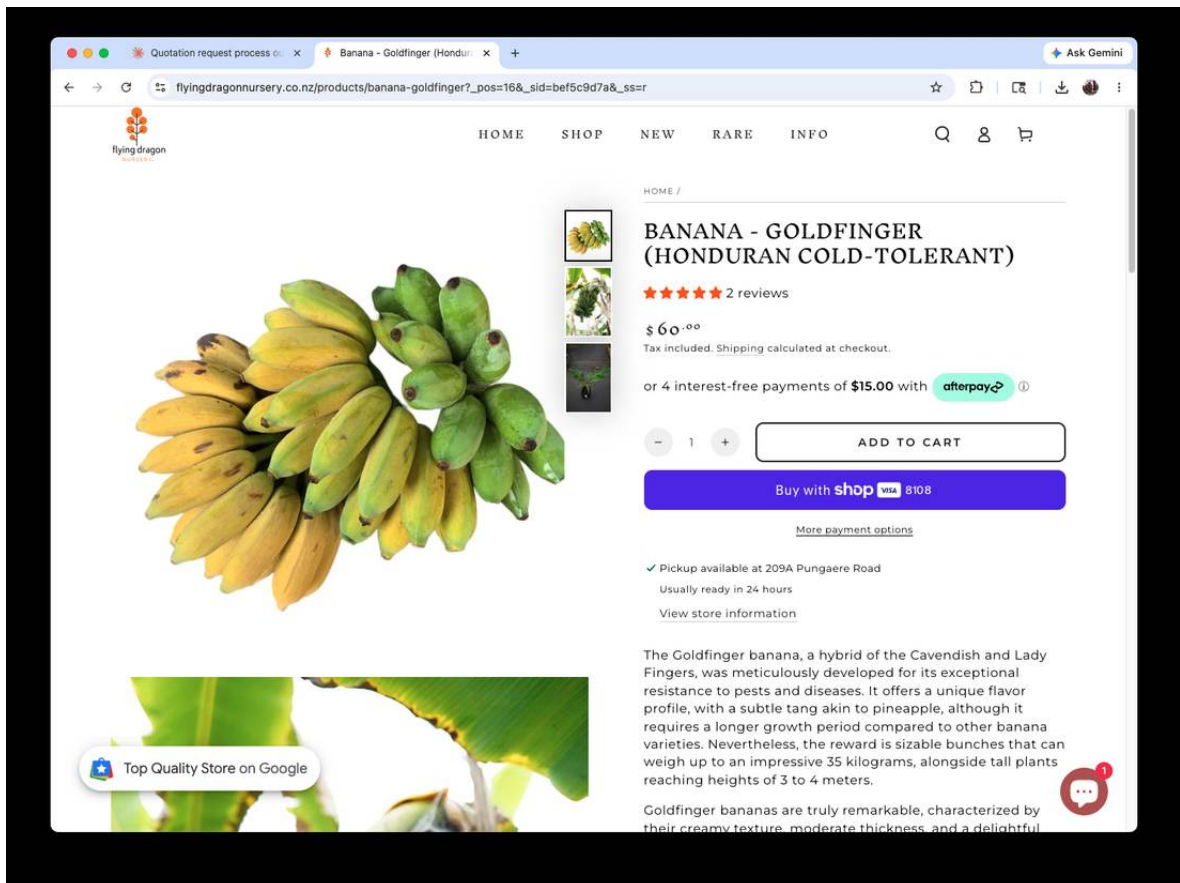
The original application specified "3 cold-tolerant variety plants (Misi Luki or Ladyfinger)" at \$150. The revised plan keeps three plants but adds variety diversity — two Misi Luki plus one Goldfinger. Total \$138.00, with \$12 underspend returned to project contingency. Final freight cost confirmed at point of order; consolidating with citrus on the same Flying Dragon order keeps freight to a single charge.

Tree Stakes, Ties, Guards and Mulch — Plan

Approach

Tree support, weed suppression, and mulching for 6 fruit trees and 3 banana plants. Local materials lead wherever possible: bamboo stakes from Donnellys Crossing (free, in-kind), sheep wool dags from local farms (in-kind), and an initial bark mulch delivery consolidated with the Kaipara Landscape Supplies soil order to avoid additional freight. The Kai Ora line covers what cannot be sourced locally: tree ties, jute weed mats, and spiral trunk guards.

Why this combination

Forgotten Fruits' planting guidance is emphatic: grass and weed competition is the single biggest cause of fruit tree failure in the first years. Heavy mulching feeds the soil fungi that feed the trees. The jute squares sit directly around each trunk as a weed-suppressing base layer; bark mulch goes on top of and around them; sheep wool dags supplement throughout the year as a slow-release nitrogen source. Spiral guards protect young trunks from accidental weed-eater damage on a publicly-accessible reserve — important for the trees' first 2–3 years.

Variance from original application

The original application specified "Stakes, ties, and initial mulch for fruit trees and bananas" at \$180. The revised plan: bamboo stakes are now in-kind (local DC), freeing budget for tree guards (added) and NZ-made biodegradable jute weed mats (added in place of plain weed matting). Total \$181, a \$1 overspend absorbed within the line.

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Section 9 — Tree Support & Mulch — Addendum

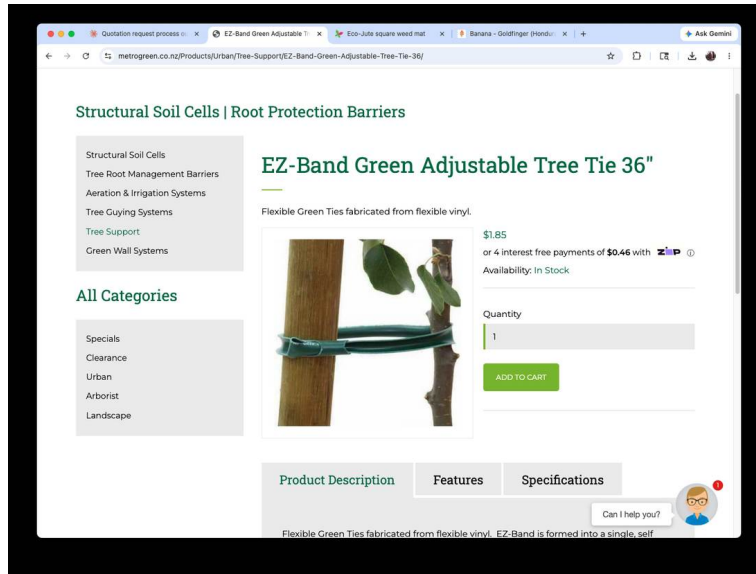
Update since the original plan PDF. The original Tree Support plan assumed 2 m³ of bark mulch delivered on the same truck as the KLS soil order at ~\$30/m³ = \$60. The actual KLS quote shows mulch needs a separate truck (additional \$448.80 delivery). Mulch from KLS has therefore been removed from the budget.

Revised mulch sourcing. First call: sheep wool dags from local farms (in-kind, slow-release nitrogen, weed suppression). Second call: smaller volumes of Forest Floor Mulch picked up locally where the delivery overhead can be avoided. Third call: local woodchip, sourced through DCCG networks at minimal or no cost.

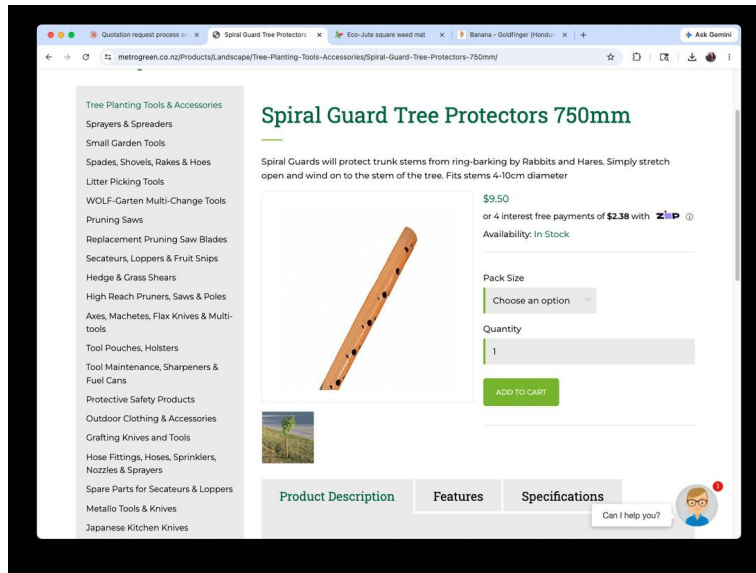
Revised line total. \$181 (original plan) – \$60 (KLS mulch line removed) ≈ **\$121**. Rounded to **\$136** after small allowance for marker pens and tie-down materials. Variance: -\$44 vs application, contributing to the soil overrun offset.

The remaining items below stay as planned: EZ-Band tree ties (MetroGreen), Eco-Jute weed mat squares (Growing Things), Spiral Tree Guards (MetroGreen), and bamboo stakes (in-kind, local).

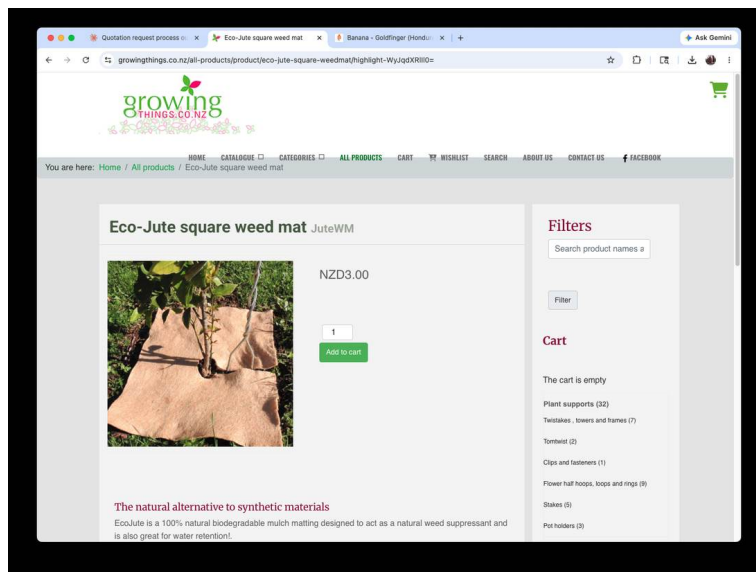
Tree Support & Mulch — Supplier evidence

Section 10 — Contingency

Budget line: \$150.00 (unchanged from application).

What this covers. Unforeseen supplier price movements between quote and spend, freight cost variance across the three fruit tree suppliers, small items that surface during build (extra fasteners, replacement seedlings, weather damage), and the rounding tolerance across the reconciled budget.

Governance. Drawdown from contingency requires DCCG committee sign-off and is recorded against the original line it relates to in project reporting. Unspent contingency is reported back to Kai Ora at project completion.

Underspend headroom. Where any line above comes in under its revised estimate at point of spend, the underspend is returned to contingency by default rather than re-spent on the originating line.

Outstanding items & next steps

These items are tracked by DCCG and will be resolved before spend against the relevant line. None of them affect the total ask to Kai Ora of \$4,530.00.

Steelmates We Give Back — NOT CONFIRMED

A speculative application has been submitted to the Steelmates We Give Back community programme for two additional beds at no cost. This is a nice-to-have, not a dependency. We have no expectation of an outcome either way at the time of this pack. If the application is declined or doesn't progress, the garden launches with four Kai Ora-funded beds; no fallback purchase is required from the Kai Ora line and the \$4,530 ask is unchanged.

Soil delivery date

KLS quote valid 30 days from 28 May 2026. Order to be placed once bed assembly date is confirmed (site needs to be ready to receive 5 m³).

Fruit tree shipping

Shipping costs across three suppliers (Forgotten Fruits, Flying Dragon, The Plant Company) are indicative. Final freight confirmed at point of order; consolidating the bananas onto the Flying Dragon order keeps that supplier's freight to a single charge.

Food stand materials list

Final materials list and Bunnings/Mitre 10 prices to be logged before the build day.

Mulch sourcing

Sheep wool dags confirmed in principle with local farms; local Forest Floor pickup and woodchip leads to be activated as the planting season approaches.

Bank account proof

Outstanding from the original application (Kai Ora supporting documents section).

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
